The Rough Riders and Spanish-American War

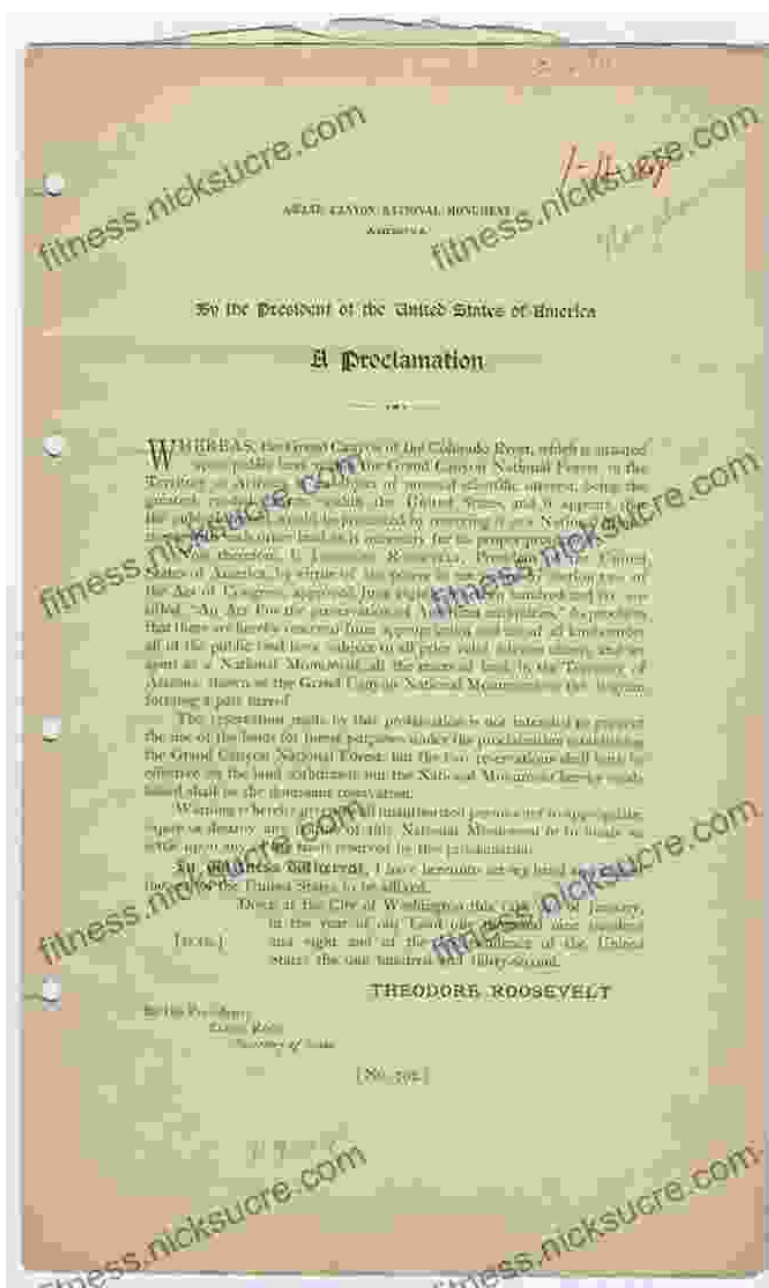

Presidency and Conservation Legacy

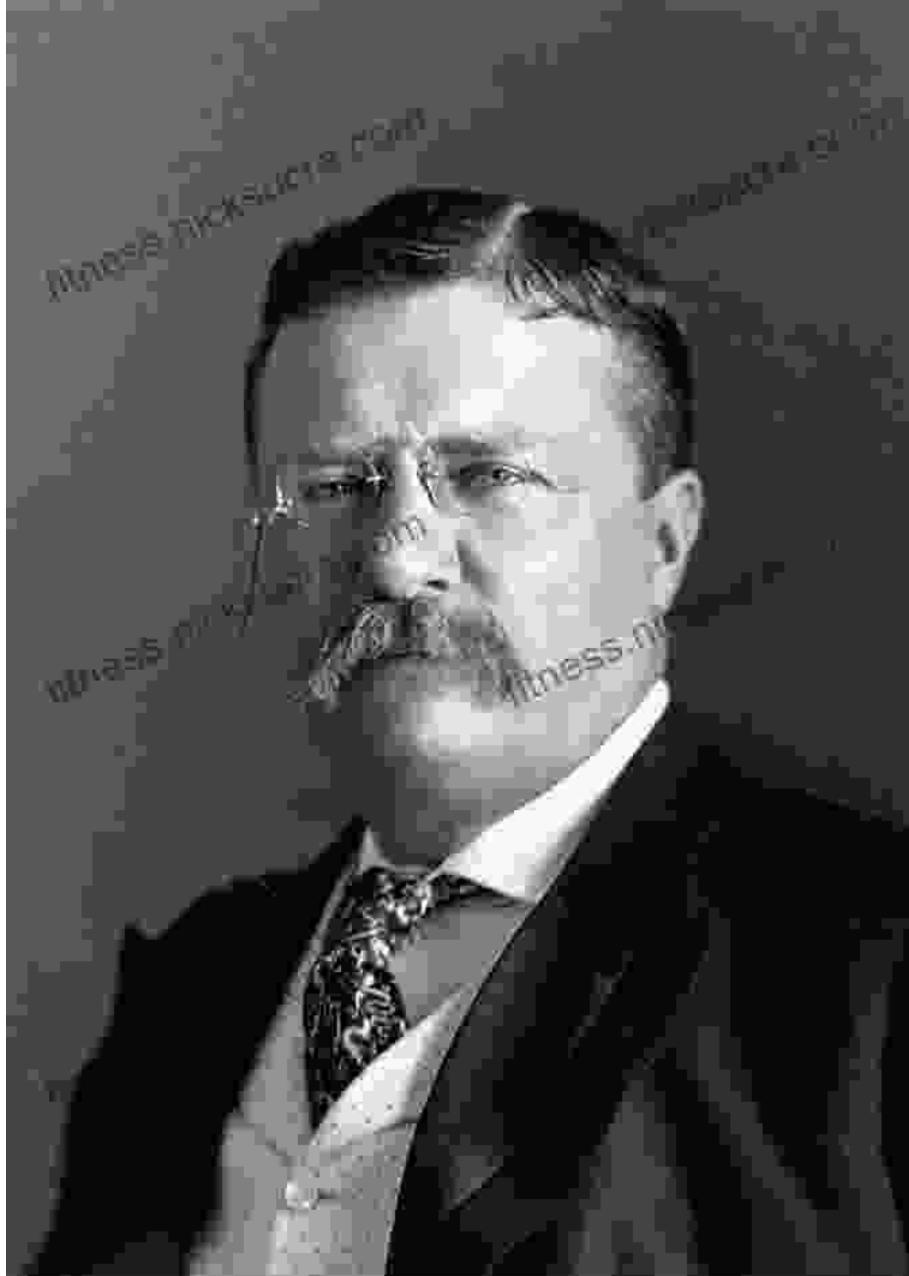
